He enjoys tying flies and has been guiding on the Front Range of Colorado professionally since 1992. In his free time, Joel pursues steelhead all over the west and Midwestern rivers of the United States. RMF River Conservation & Fly Fishing Youth Day Camp

July 21-22-23 and 28-29-30, 2011

On February 1st the application window will open for youths to submit their essay, completed parental paperwork packets and \$30.00 application fee. The fee will be refunded to any applicant if not accepted. On February 1st a full application file



will be activated on our <u>RMF website</u> for download. The Day Camp program is designed for 15 campers and we expect that all openings will be filled.

Volunteers to help with the Day Camp can view a daily activities schedule on the <u>RMF website</u>, also beginning February 1st. Last year we had 24 volunteers for the pilot group of nine campers, but this year we will need an

additional 10 volunteers to ensure we maintain a 1:1 adult-to-camper ratio for instructional and on-river sessions.

Boy Scout Fly Fishing Merit Badge Training Sessions Scheduled



Two training sessions are scheduled for the Boy Scout Fly Fishing Merit Badge. The **first session** will be held on Saturday, April 2nd from 9:00 am to 3:00 pm at the Westminster Presbyterian Church, 1709 West Elizabeth Street, Fort Collins (located

four blocks East of Taft Hill Road). We need six volunteers for this session and a sack lunch will be provided. Three groups of Scouts will rotate between clinic instructors' stations to perform casting (overhead & roll...at Avery Lake a half-block nearby), knots (arbor, clinch, nail, and loop-to-loop), and fly tying (bugger, pupa nymph, and deer hair caddis).

The **second session** will be held on Saturday, May 21st (exact times to be determined) at Weaver Lake which is located at the BSA Camp Ben Delatour (between Rustic and Red Feather Lakes). This is a heavily stocked one and a half acre lake. Scouts will catch and correctly handle two fish during this session.

Trout in the Classroom

In the last issue we explained that we received a double egg order, and consciously decided to hatch them all...fully aware that our 418 hatched fish would be twice the number designated for our 50 gallon tank. So when the fish hatched we also doubled to daily the number of water changes, water chemistry tests and tank cleanings.



Fortunately, teacher
Nathan Clark has
aquaculture experience
and when fish began to
die one-at-a-time he
suspected and
confirmed with testing
that dissolved oxygen
was out of balance.
He had the TIC Project
student team install an
additional, larger air

pump system, and the fish stopped dying...now 408 remain. On December 14th several chapter board members visited the TIC tank and team, and all was stable and looked good.

This week we communicated with the CDOW's aquatic pathology department requesting guidance about when we should halve our fish population, and how and when it should be accomplished. At the Flypaper's production deadline we had not yet received a response.
