Friends of the Big Thompson River Walt Graul, Loveland Fishing Club

In 1977, following the big flood, Larimer County purchased multiple parcels of land along the Big Thompson River and North Fork. They did this with federal Land and Water Conservation Funds that required the County to agree to maintain the lands for public recreation in perpetuity. However, in 2004, the County removed the 'perpetuity' clause by transferring it to another property with no coldwater fishing and put the Big T properties on a potential disposal list. Makes one think differently about 'perpetuity'. In 2005, The Loveland Fishing Club recommended that the County retain 12 properties that represent reasonable fishing access. Because of this issue, a group called Friends of the Big Thompson River was formed and represents several thousand individuals. It includes: Rocky Mountain Flycasters, The Loveland Fishing Club, The Colorado Wildlife Federation, St. Peters Flyshop, Bob's Flyshop, Elkhorn Rod and Reel, Bennett's Tackle Shop, and numerous individual members along the Front Range and even some nonresidents.

Thus far, the County has agreed to keep about half of the recommended fishing access sites along the Big T. The above representatives of the public have continued to push for retention of fishing access on the remaining recommended areas.

Last July, we submitted a petition with 200 signatures to illustrate

the continuing interest. Last fall, we requested that the County develop a plan with a timetable for resolution of the issue that has been in progress going on 7 years. At the County Parks Advisory Board Meeting on Jan 11, 2011, County staff recommended that they will not sell the parcels remaining on the Loveland Fishing Club retention list without a guarantee that they will remain open to fishing. They hope to take action on all these parcels in 2011. This recommendation will need to be approved by the Parks Advisory Board and the County Commissioners.

So, at this point we are hopeful. However, we know that actions do not always follow well meaning intentions, so we intend to remain active in this process until it is finalized. 2011 Youth River Conservation and Fly Fishing Day Camp Dennis Cook, Youth Outreach Chair

Volunteers are needed for this July's <u>Youth River</u> <u>Conservation and Fly Fishing Day Camp</u>. We will have 15 youths ages 14-18, and need more volunteer Mentors for general supervision and instruction.

SESSION 1: On **Thursday July 21st** between approximately 4:30-6:00pm we need a half-dozen volunteers for dry land, back-casting to help the youths succeed following instructions from the central lead instructor. On **Friday July 22nd** between approximately 8:00-10:00am we need a dozen volunteers for knots tying to help the youths succeed following instructions from the central lead instructor. Also, on **Friday July 22nd** between approximately 3:00-6:00pm we need fifteen volunteers to help with one-on-one back and roll casting instruction on local ponds (possibly Swift Ponds).

On **Saturday July 23rd** (Phantom Canyon) starting at 11:00am, is a heavy requirement for one-on-one, wade fishing. We need fifteen volunteers for skills mentoring and in-river safety. Campers will have already received back and roll casting, reading the water and other basic instructions, and need one-on-one practice under close adult supervision.

SESSION 2: On Thursday, July 28th from 8:00am-3:00pm, we need a dozen volunteers to provide safety supervision during the in-river electro-shocking, snorkeling and entomology activities being taught by the CDOW. Also on Thursday July 28th between 3:00-6:00pm, we need eight fly tiers to help the youths succeed following instructions from the central lead instructor. On Friday July 29th all morning starting at 8:00am, we need twelve volunteers to help oversee the willows planting conservation project at Glade Park on the Big Thompson. On Friday July 29th starting at 2:00pm for the afternoon, we need volunteers to help the campers be successful shore casting for bass in ponds at Sylvan Dale Ranch.

On **Saturday July 30th** between 8:00am-12:00pm, we need eight fly tiers to help the youths succeed following instructions from the central lead instructor. Later on **Saturday July 30th** (Gateway Park) starting at 2:00pm...is another heavy requirement for one-on-one, wade fishing. We need fifteen volunteers for skills mentoring and in-river safety. Campers will have already received back & roll casting, reading the water and other basic instructions, and need one-on-one practice under close adult supervision.

Saturday, April 2nd

Between 9:00am to 3:00pm at Westminster Presbyterian Church - 1709 West Elizabeth Street, Fort Collins (4 blocks East of Taft Hill Road) we need six volunteers (Those who signed up at our January meeting need not volunteer again.) A sack lunch will be provided.

Three groups of Scouts will rotate between clinic instructors' stations to learn Casting (overhead & roll...at Avery Lake a half-block nearby, Knots (arbor, clinch, surgeon, nail & loop-to-loop) and Fly Tying (bugger, pupa nymph & deer hair caddis).

Saturday, May 21st

Exact times to be determined. At Weaver Lake - <u>BSA Camp</u> <u>Ben Delatour</u> (between Rustic & Red Feather) which is a heavily stocked 1¹/₂ acre lake, we will help the Scouts catch and correctly handle at least two fish.

Last week the TIC student team began removing the smallest fingerlings to reduce the tank population from 400 fish to about 200, which is the recommended population for our 50 gallon tank. The largest fingerlings are now at almost 2½ inches, and many of the smallest were barely a full inch long, which illustrates that the population was too large for them all to get enough food. Reducing the number of fish also reduces chances that bacterial gill disease will develop which could infect the entire population. BGD occurs from over crowding that causes build up of metabolites (ammonia) creating poor water quality.

Relocation of the tank and remaining fish is expected to be scheduled in late February or early March after the major facilities move into the new Agriculture Department building has been completed.
