Featured Guest Speaker for May

Steve Schweitzer is our featured guest speaker for May 18th. Steve has been part of the fly fishing retail and conservation industry for over 20 years, including a key position as the V.P. of Sales & Marketing at Whiting Farms, where he created the popular products "Bird Fur", "Fly Tyer's Variety Pack" and the "Whiting Hackle Gauge".



He has also served as President of the Lee Wulff chapter and Treasurer of the Illinois Council of

Trout Unlimited. Other behind-the-scenes involvement in the industry includes product marketing consulting for leading fly rod and fly tying tool manufacturers and an off-n-on fly shop rat since the early 90's.

Steve is the co-founder of the popular international fly fishing website, globalflyfisher.com, which is in its 16th year. Among his 50+ articles online, his leader tying article, *Hyper-Compleat Guide to Tying Leaders* and accompanying LeaderCalc software has surpassed a quarter million downloads since original publication in 1999.

Over the years, Steve has authored numerous articles appearing in *Fly Fisherman Magazine*, *Angling Trade*, *Trout*, *Wall Street Journal* and a myriad of other regional angling publications. He also is contributing author & illustrator for the book *Drag Free Drift - Presentation Techniques for Fly Fishing*, authored by Joe Kissane. Day Camp Applications Being Accepted

Rocky Mountain Flycasters is now accepting applications from students aged 14 to 18 for its second annual Northern Colorado Youth River Conservation & Fly Fishing Day Camp which will be held on **July 21-23 and July 28-30** at various locations around Fort Collins. The camp is designed to educate students on the importance of coldwater conservation while providing hands-on fly-fishing instruction.

Eagle's Nest - Volunteers Needed Guy Turenne, Project Leader and At-Large Member

Come out and assist Larimer County by providing trail maintenance at Eagle's Nest Open Space that may not otherwise be done, keeping trails in better shape for safer and more enjoyable use. The first trail maintenance day is scheduled for June 1. The county requires at least 10 volunteers in order to hold the event. Trail maintenance at Eagle's Nest is an day affair. We generally start at the parking area around 9:00 a.m. and work until around 4:00 p.m. with a mid-day lunch break. The work can involve removing vegetation encroaching on trails, rebuilding water bars, etc. using a variety of hand tools. CDOW Volunteer Opportunities <u>Dave Piske</u>, Conservation Chair

Many Flypaper readers will enthusiastically recall their volunteer experiences last year while helping Colorado Department of Wildlife at two events. Most memorable was a 3-day project to facilitate an experiment involving survivability of disease-resistant rainbow trout in the main stem of the Poudre River. RMF-TU volunteers also enjoyed assisting the fishing experiences of young anglers at CDOW's

Outdoor Skills Day held at the Delatour Boy Scout Reservation.

This year there will be several new CDOW-sponsored events needing volunteers to help make them successful. And, further good news is that it will be easier than ever for volunteers to enroll.

First Event: Colorado Special Olympics

CDOW is seeking at least 20 volunteers to assist with a fishing clinic as part of the Colorado Special Olympics. It is scheduled to be held at Swift Ponds in Fort Collins on Saturday, June 11, 2011 from 8:00 am to 5:00 pm. Volunteers are needed to assist with set-up and break-down, manning the casting station, knot tying station, assist with fishing, and working at an urban wildlife booth. Lunch will be provided.



This event is for 200 special needs participants and their mentors. The day is divided into a morning group and an afternoon group with 100 participants at each. There will be an overlap of the two groups at lunch. When registering (see more below) volunteers should indicate their preferences as to the type of activities they prefer, and whether they are available for all day, or just the morning or afternoon sessions.

Future CDOW Events

The Special Olympics is the first of several fishing-related volunteer opportunities being organized by Allison Kincaid, CDOW's Hunting/Fishing Outreach Coordinator for the NE Region. She is planning several more clinics in the coming months and she's really interested in working with RMF-TU volunteers.

Special Registration for RMF-TU Volunteers

Because each CDOW event can utilize only a limited number of volunteers, special provisions are being established for enrollment of RMF-TU volunteers. They would be contacted first for fishing events before CDOW opens it to general volunteers. To receive advance notices for each of the

forthcoming events, you should register now to get on the advance-notice list, even if you cannot volunteer for the Special Olympics event. Donna Forrest, CDOW's Education & Volunteer Program Assistant, will be the person that RMF-TU volunteers will work with to get signed up as a CDOW volunteer.

Here is the information for registering

Go to the <u>CDOW Volunteer website</u> and complete and submit an online application. Enter the following text, "Allison Kincaid, Fishing Clinics" on the "Additional Information" page where the line states "If yes, list project or staff person." Once your application has been submitted, please contact Donna via <u>email</u>, letting her know you are a member of Rocky Mountain Flycasters chapter of Trout Unlimited and that you have completed the registration process. Donna will then get your registration activated.

Finally, you won't have to worry about submitting the online test. But it is advisable for you to review and familiarize yourself with the <u>CDOW Volunteer Handbook</u>. Donna will contact you via email once your profile is activated, so it's important that you have an active email address.

Adopt-a-Trail at Gateway Natural Area Dave Piske, Conservation Chair



Gateway Natural Area at the confluence of the North Fork of the Poudre with the main flow of the Poudre River, being close to Fort Collins, is a favorite fishing site of many RMF members. It also is the graduation site for RMF's River Conservation & Fly Fishing Youth Day Camp.

Gateway is one of City of Fort Collins Natural Areas, a collection of special places in and near Fort Collins that provide public access to over 32,000 acres of natural areas. Recently the Fort Collins Natural Areas management staff invited the RMF Board of Directors to consider participating in any of several candidate activities supporting the management of Natural Areas. Your Board decided that Gateway is the Fort Collins Natural Area most relevant to

RMF members' interests. More specifically, RMF plans to enter into an Adopt-a-Trail agreement with Fort Collins in which RMF volunteers will participate in foot-trail maintenance within the Gateway Natural Area. This activity will be similar to the trail maintenance work that RMF volunteers have conducted during the past 6 years at Larimer County's Eagles Nest Open Space. So, Gateway will become an addition to what RMF volunteers are already doing to protect and maintain trails in our nearby public lands natural areas.

The Adopt-a-Trail agreement is in the formative process, so stay tuned for additional news as it develops.

Adventures for Volunteers in Rocky Mountain National Park

During the May 18 general chapter meeting you will not only learn from Steve Schweitzer about fishing in Rocky Mountain National, but also be able to meet Chris Kennedy, the U. S. Fish and Wildlife Services fisheries biologist in the Park. Chris's summertime assignment is to conduct field research on trout populations in RMNP and he has been doing this for many years.

This fieldwork consists of capturing trout, identifying the species, noting any abnormalities, measuring and weighing them, recording the statistics, and returning the trout unharmed to the water where caught. Capture methods in streams include electro-shocking & dip netting, and in lakes; gill netting and hook & line capture (sometimes called fly fishing).

Chris is the only person on the Park staff that conducts this work. Obviously the tasks cannot be accomplished by one person acting alone. So Chris depends on volunteers to help him accomplish his field research. Both male and female volunteers are welcome. Volunteering to assist Chris is an excellent way to experience the most pristine and scenic areas in the backcountry. You will become acquainted with volunteers from several Colorado TU chapters. And from Chris, you will learn



much about the habits and habitats of both native and introduced trout species. It all adds up to a bundle of fun, some good exercise, and your valuable contribution to native trout fisheries research. What's more, Chris shows his appreciation for your help by sponsoring a season-end

Volunteer Appreciation Dinner at a resort in Estes Park at the end of the fieldwork season.

During the research field season, in July, August and September, there is a wide range of types of trips. Trips may be as short as one day, or as long as five days. Overnight stays may be at a Park Ranger cabin or in primitive backcountry campgrounds. Research sites may be adjacent to a road, or as much as 10 miles one-way from a road. Elevation changes from a road to the research site may be as little as none or more than 3,000 vertical feet. Some trips may have pack mules to carry the heavy gear. Some camping equipment (tents & sleeping bags) may be borrowed from the Alpine Anglers chapter of TU in Estes Park. So you can select trips that suit both your interests and your stamina.

The schedule of trips planned for 2011 will be available at our May 18 meeting. The trip schedule will also be posted on the RMF web site. The primary contact for people who want to volunteer is <u>Austin Condon</u> a member of Alpine Anglers TU. If you want to volunteer, ask Austin to put your name on his volunteer list and he will send you update emails shortly before each trip. Then, when you see a trip you want to take, let Austin know you are volunteering for it.

Children's Water Festival Dennis Cook, Youth Outreach Chair

On April 27th Jerry Pelis, Phil Keller and Dennis Cook hosted 144 fourth graders and their teachers at the 20th Anniversary of this event that is one of the oldest in the nation and is co-sponsored by the West Greeley Conservation District. The festival



brings water professionals from around Colorado to provide presentations and activities about water, conservation, human health, and aquatic life. It's goal is to teach students that water is an essential, limited resource and that they can take action.

RMF's volunteers' six presentations explained about Colorado's diminishing rivers due to reduced snowfall and increasing population, trans-basin diversions supplying western Colorado water to Front Range residents, and that we need to take measures to help our threatened rivers. They explained that aquatic insects are indicators of river health and the riparian food chain foundation.



Ask About Fly Fishing - Internet Radio was created, from a love of learning about fly fishing, by it's founders D. Roger Maves and Don Bishop. Founded on January 1st, 2006, it started with the idea that fellow fly fishers should be able to learn from fly fishing experts, while sitting in the comfort of their home. By combining both streaming audio over the Internet and the telephone conference call, Roger and Don defined the delivery methods for their live interviews. Listeners can listen to the broadcasts by telephone or by just clicking on a link on their computer screen.

Taking it a step further, each call is recorded and transcribed so that even if a listener can't make the live call, they can listen to the recorded call or read the written transcripts at a later date. Over time the archived calls become part of a library that listeners can access whenever they want. Ask About Fly Fishing also offers other global services to its users including directories for shops, guides, travel, media and clubs and an events calendar. Ask About Fly Fishing seeks to create a center for education, learning and communication between fly fishers worldwide.
