Greeley's Milton Seaman Reservoir Gates Lee Evans, Interim President



Rocky Mountain Flycasters has just received the following notice from Eric Reckentine, Deputy Director of Water Resources for the City of Greeley. This news may affect the fishing and water quality of the stretch of the North Fork of the Poudre from Seaman's Reservoir down to the confluence with the main stem. The City of Greeley is working closely with CDOW and all necessary approvals are in place. Our Chapter wishes to inform you of this repair and will keep you posted as to developments. If you're fishing there and see conditions that alarm you, please send an email to Lee Evans. The notice reads:

Greeley's Milton Seaman Reservoir gates have faced a gradual loss of mechanical function and has compromised safe reservoir operations. The existing outlet gates, and the hydraulics that operate them, date back to the original reservoir construction in the late 1940s. Despite routine

maintenance over the years, two of the five gates are currently inoperable.

Greeley has determined that it must replace all five gate cylinders and associated hydraulic elements to ensure the continued safe operation of the reservoir. The City plans to start the project on September 14, 2011 and complete it no later than April 1, 2012. Unfortunately, Greeley cannot perform this maintenance without some temporary impacts to the Poudre River North Fork and potentially its main stem. I would like to speak with you and keep you informed of the potential impacts which will include darkening of the water, potential sheen from the biodegradable oils removed from the existing hydraulic system, and potentially fish kill. We have contacted or are in the process of contacting the affected parties, and have regulatory approvals etc.

Trustee Profile - Dick Jefferies

Editor's note: Dick was recently appointed to the Board of Trustees and he currently serves as the RMF Vice President. Here are a few Q&As to get to know Dick a little better:

Can you tell us a little bit about yourself, where you grew up, and how you



became interested in TU? I am a native Coloradoan born and raised on a farm northeast of Brush and more specifically near the small farming community of Hillrose. If memory serves me correctly, I was with the same six kids for the first six years of elementary school in Hillrose. Imagine my culture shock moving to Ft. Collins in the late 70's when the population was around 55,000 people. I have fond memories of growing up on the family farm but especially of my Dad's insistence that at least once a summer we had to get to the mountains for some fly fishing. I still have the rod and reel my Dad bought for me when I was young and have managed to keep a few of the flies we used back then. I have known about TU for years and recently, when I saw some of the activities the local organization was doing in the area of youth development, I was convinced it was a place for me to serve.

Why are you interested in serving on the Board? After several years of leadership in non-profit youth service organizations, especially one serving an outdoor and service mission, I became accutely aware of the value volunteers bring to the non-profit world. I did and still do marvel at the impact a small group of dedicated individuals can have when they are simply directed by the mission of an organization. Since I believe whole heartedly in the mission of Trout Unlimited and therefore the mission of the local chapter, I know there will be ample opportunity for great good to come from volunteering my time with this organization. Furthermore, what could be better than volunteering your time with a group of individuals, both men and women, who hold the sport and art of flyfishing so dear. Good people, an opportunity to serve my community through a solid organization and all centered around flyfishing. So surprising, this opportunity to serve in Nirvana.

What motivates you as a volunteer? I think the motivation an individual brings to a group is directly proportionate to their belief in the mission of the organization. Trailgate Parties at Gateway Natural Area Dave Piske, Conservation Chair



Early on the refreshingly cool morning of September 10, twelve RMF TU volunteers gathered at the Fort Collins Gateway Natural Area in the Poudre River Canyon. They were there for the second, and last for this year, Trailgate Party.

To open the party, and with six deer appropriately romping in the meadow behind her, Catherine Dillon, Service Learning Educator at Fort Collins Natural Areas Group, presented an illustrated talk on wildlife recently observed in the Gateway Natural Area. Her talk, based on observations recorded by Ranger Steve, was applauded by the volunteers as the deer paraded off-stage toward the Poudre River.

Then Todd Juhasz, Trail Technician at Fort Collins Natural Areas Group, explained the tasks the volunteers were to undertake. One part of the work involved drainage improvements on the Overlook Trail. Widening of its corridor had been the object of volunteers' attention during the first Trailgate Party in August. The major attention this day was on the Black Powder Trail. It involved clearing bushes obstructing the trail corridor and also making trail drainage improvements at strategic locations. The energetic volunteers completed all the work that Todd had set as the objective for the day within the planned three-hour time span. Todd supervised the volunteer team doing the drainage improvements, and Catherine lead the team doing the corridor widening.

To conclude the organized portion of the day, RMF Volunteer Coordinators Teri and Scott Gardner produced a luncheon of sandwiches with an assortment of condiments and supplemented with a delicious pecan pie. The entire event was well-planned by Catherine, Todd, Teri, and Scott and the volunteers appreciated those preparations that made the day go so smoothly. At the close of the Trailgate Party, those who had the time and inclination went flyfishing in the sparkling waters of the Poudre River, but avoided the North Fork because its waters are temporarily stained by repairs to the discharge gates on the Seaman Dam just upstream.
