

Trout in the Classroom - Windsor High School

170 Bellaire rainbow strain eggs arrived October 13th by FedEx and the TIC student team had the tank, food and supplies all in readiness for counting and handling. The eyed eggs arrived in a Styrofoam container packed in



ice. Seven of the eggs were dead so the remaining eggs were placed into the hatching basket and the tank was darkened for hatching. The eggs hatched the last few days of October, into tiny sac fry referred to as alevins (see basket inset photo) and on the 26th were released to dive and hide among the gravel on the tank bottom where they fed on their sacs until they surfaced seeking food on the 31st, and began being fed very fine granular fish food. Nineteen eggs and fish are known to have died during the hatching basket and gravel phases, so currently there are 144 approximately ¾" long remaining living fish. The TIC student team has been trained to take water samples, run water chemistry tests, observe fish behaviors and record their findings in a detailed daily log manual.

Recap of 2011 Conservation Activities & Outlook for 2012

Two snowfalls during the past two weeks added emphasis to the realization that our conservation activities at the higher elevations have ended for another year. It was a fruitful set of projects that RMF volunteers can be proud of accomplishing.

During 2011 RMF added three new projects that are expected to continue during 2012, and continued to support three long standing activities. New projects were formal adoption of grounds and stream cleanups at Narrows Park (Larimer County); trail maintenance at Gateway Natural Area (City of Fort Collins); and collection of waste fishing line from receptacles along the Poudre River within the City of Fort Collins.



RMF volunteers also continued to support the US Fish and Wildlife Service biologist assigned to Rocky Mountain Park in conducting field research on greenback cutthroat trout populations within the Park, and also in conducting prerestoration surveys on the headwaters of the Poudre River and its tributaries in the northern section of the Park. These surveys are in anticipation of a long-term project to restore native trout to these streams during years to come. Additional similar surveys will be conducted during 2012.

Alternating-year annual stream cleanups of the Big Thompson and Poudre Rivers continued with this year's stream being the Big T downstream of Drake. Upstream of Drake, cleanups are conducted by Alpine Anglers TU based in Estes Park. In 2012, RMF's river cleanup will focus on the Poudre Canyon.

RMF volunteers also continued to help maintain the trails along the North Fork of the Poudre within the Phantom Canyon Preserve of The Nature Conservancy. This is a long-standing cooperative project that is expected to continue well into the future.

Many kudos to all the volunteers who contributed their time and labor to these activities during 2011.

If you missed participating during 2011, and would like to volunteer for any of these projects during 2012, each activity will be publicized in the Flypaper and on the web-site as the time for it approaches.
