

October 18 Membership Meeting

Our speaker/presenter for the October 16 membership meeting will be our own Adam Omernick, Owner of Zen Fly Fishing Gear and NoCoFlyFishing.com. Adam is a Federation of Fly Fishers Certified Casting instructor and the 2013 Rocky Mountain Flycasters Youth Camp Camp Coordinator. He will speak about and demonstrate "Tenkara".

Tenkara what? This fly fishing method was specifically designed by professional fishermen in the high mountain streams of Japan and is perfect for our rivers here in Northern Colorado. It was made to be streamlined, efficient and easy to transport. The traditional fly used with a tenkara rod is called a *kabari* fly and is tied with a minimum of materials. With the gear down to a minimum the focus then becomes the presentation of the fly. A 12 foot rod yields easy drag-free drifts and is perfect for pocket water. Come cast some rods, check out the gear, see the flies and experience what tenkara fishing is all about.

The program begins at 7:00 PM at the senior center. Come early (6:30) to watch Ben Zomer tie *kabari* flies and for conversation.

Event Report: Trout in the Classroom




The Front Range Community College Career Pathways high school class completed its Trout in the Classroom project Monday evening, September 23rd. Twenty eight months old rainbow fingerlings between 1.88 to 3.25 inches length remained alive and healthy after having enjoyed extended life during the summer, and were released at Swift Ponds southeast of Fort Collins. The fish were transported in a bucket equipped with a battery powered air bubbler to enrich the water with oxygen to a

pond where the class had constructed a small in-water habitat.

Before release, the bucket water had to be warmed from its approximately 55 degrees to about the same temperature as the 67 degrees pond by gradually adding more pond water. Tempering the bucket water took longed than expected, and it was well toward dark before two students dressed in waders could carry the bucket into the pond and release the fish close to the habitat.

After cleaning the equipment this year's new Career Pathways high school class will also conduct another TIC project, and eggs are expected to be delivered around mid-October.

Major Poudre River Improvement Receives Funding

A grant of \$300,000 from the Colorado Water Conservation Board to the Colorado Water Trust, was awarded by unanimous consent of the CWCB on September 24. The grant will provide funding for removal of a major barrier to fish passage in the Poudre River just upstream of the North Shields Street bridge.

The Colorado Water Trust and the City of Fort Collins Natural Areas Department are partnering to remove the Josh Ames Diversion dam, a six-foot-high bank-to-bank concrete barrier, unused for any beneficial purpose since 1960. The Josh Ames removal project is one of more than 25 ongoing and planned Poudre River improvements within the Natural Areas Department's Poudre River Improvement Program.

TU Chapters Coordinate Flood Recovery Plans for Coldwater Fisheries

On October 4, representatives from four Front Range Trout Unlimited chapters and guests from several involved government agencies met to explore coordinated strategies and objectives for participating in the restoration of trout fisheries and related resources that were damaged during the September floods. The major streams involved include Boulder Creek, St. Vrain River, Big Thompson River and Cache la Poudre River.

Colorado TU Executive Director David Nickum chaired the meeting. Contacts with Colorado state government and federal agencies have been initiated, and their assessments of flood damages will provide guidance on priorities, substance, and estimated costs of restoring trout-related resources in those four watersheds.

Specific post-flood actions for TU chapters will be determined as damage assessments become available and potential funding sources are better clarified. The urgency of certain restoration actions was identified. The need for coordination of TU chapter efforts was identified, and Colorado TU is taking the role of the central office for such coordination.

Citizen's Inputs Sought as Colorado Officials Tackle Intractable Puzzle

The puzzle, simply stated, is: Given a limited amount of water that Mother Nature supplies to Colorado, what's the best way to utilize that supply to meet the needs of diverse stakeholders and a population expected to double in size by the year 2050?

It's generally conceded that the needs for water will exceed supplies long before the year 2050 arrives. And there is a growing realization that changes to Colorado laws will likely be needed as part of a solution to the puzzle.

Recognizing the need to find a solution, Governor Hickenlooper has decreed a new Colorado Water Plan is to be completed by the end of 2014. Locally on September 28, State Senator John Kefalas and Assemblyman Randy Fischer sponsored a public forum seeking inputs from local citizens and organizations as the legislators consider new laws yet to be proposed. Five members of Rocky Mountain Flycasters' leadership team attended the forum. The forum included a panel of five persons representing diverse viewpoints of vitally interested stakeholders. The Trout Unlimited panelist was Drew Peternell, Trout Unlimited's director of the Colorado Water Project.

Drew described TU's five "Core Values" successfully employed in West Slope water issues. He suggested they are similarly appropriate in developing a state-wide water plan. A description of TU's Core Values can be seen at: www.ourcoriver.com, then click "Core Values" on the home page.

Summarized, TU's Core Values are:

- Cooperation, not conflict among all affected interests.
- Protect Colorado's quality of life, including healthy, flowing streams.
- Modernize aging irrigation infrastructure to conserve water used in agriculture.
- Explore innovative new ways of managing water resources.
- Leave water in its natural basin and do not create new trans-basin diversions.
