



Challenges to the Clean Water Act

Dear Flypaper Readers:

By now I hope you've heard a bit about the Clean Water Act rulemaking that EPA and the Army Corps are pursuing, to help clarify what waters are protected under the Clean Water Act. Without the rulemaking, it is not clear whether tributary and feeder streams that do not necessarily flow year round will be protected - even though discharge into those areas clearly effects downstream river health. In Colorado this is a big deal, as around 75% of our stream miles are intermittent or ephemeral and could therefore be at risk. Colorado TU has already been working on this issue and they have an action alert up on the Colorado TU website http://www.coloradotu.org and Colorado TU Executive Director David Nickum had an op-ed piece earlier in the year in the Denver Post you can read at:

While the rulemaking process is still proceeding - with public comments due in October - there is a growing threat that Congress may step in and try to block the process. That would be bad news for water quality and for trout.

COLORADO WATER PLAN MOVES AHEAD ON MANY FRONTS

Governor Hickenlooper has called for filling the vacuum of having no statewide Colorado water plan by charging state government agencies to produce a Draft Colorado Water Plan and presenting it to him by the end of this year. There is a tremendous amount of activity going on to produce such a report.

Within our home waters, the South Platte Basin Roundtable has produced a draft report that reflects the views of a host of interested parties. Colorado Trout Unlimited has provided input comments to that plan, as have many other parties with wide-ranging and diverse interests.

Given our readers' strong interests in local waters, it follows that each of us should become informed about the issues and proposed plans for the South Platte basin. That draft plan can

be read at www.coloradowaterplan.com, click on: Resources, then: IBCC and Roundtable Documents, and scroll down to: DRAFT Metro/South Platte Basin Implementation Plan. You will encounter an astounding 404-page document, but scanning the table of contents will get you to topics most interesting to you.

On Wednesday, September 17, at the Fort Collins Senior Center, from 1 PM to 4 PM there will be a legislative hearing for public input. Representative Randy Fischer, chairman of the legislative committee interested in the Colorado Water Plan, expects there will be 6-8 members of the legislative Water Resources Review Committee there to hear from the public. Note that this is during the afternoon of the Rocky Mountain Flycasters September meeting and in the same building. Hopefully many of you will be able to attend both meetings.

At the legislative hearing, Sean Cronin as chairman of the South Platte Basin Roundtable, will give a brief presentation with highlights of the South Platte Basin Draft Implementation Plan for the meeting attendees to respond to.

Coalition for the Poudre River Watershed Launches Community-driven Restoration Planning

The Coalition for the Poudre River Watershed is launching a new initiative to plan and prioritize new watershed restoration activities in the upper Poudre watershed as a long term follow-on to its High Park post-fire recovery projects. The dual aims are to build a robust community-driven watershed restoration plan that will define restoration priorities, and to lay a foundation for a workable watershed investment fund that will help finance such projects.

If participation in this sounds interesting to you, your input into this process is invited and will be much appreciated. To learn more about participation in an advisory capacity to CPRW and its partner, the Colorado Conservation Exchange, plan to attend a kick-off meeting on Tuesday, September 23 from 8:30 AM until noon. The place will be the Carter Lake meeting room on the 1st floor of the Larimer County Building in Fort Collins.

Discussion topics will include:

- Purpose, roles, and tasks of the committee
- Watershed issues/priorities that should be addressed
- Information currently available as a foundation for planning restoration priorities
- Best approaches for determining restoration priorities

A detailed agenda, meeting materials, and directions will be circulated prior to the meeting. You can still sign up for this trip. You can wade fish the Green River easily, or get a buddy and rent a raft to float fish the river. If you have any questions about this trip, please give Mark Miller a call or email. You have to fish this river someday! It's absolutely beautiful!

We plan to leave about 7-8 a.m. on Friday morning, Sept 12th, and return home about 10 pm Monday night (you can also plan to come back on Sunday). Cost will be about \$100 for 2 nights lodging, or \$150 for 3 nights, with food and Utah licenses on top of that.

This is a good trip for new and other anglers trying to learn about more good river spots, or for others who haven't yet ventured beyond the canyon's lower or middle stretches. We all fish just as friends enjoying our pastime amid beautiful fall colors along these ruggedly beautiful waters, spinning stories of other exciting places, occasionally seeing a wayward moose, and sharing tips about how to catch more or larger fish.
