

Accordingly, our Let's Go Fishing Coordinator Mark Miller has responded to your preferences by scheduling trips to The Loch, Dream Lake, the headwaters of the Colorado River, and to the Big Thompson this spring and summer.

And, we are especially pleased that Kirk Bien, owner of Kirk's Fly Shop in Estes Park, has agreed to give us a few tips on fishing these venues and others in RMNP. Kirk has been fly fishing for 20 years, and guiding for 12. And, Rocky Mountain National Park,

specifically Forest Canyon and the Big Thompson River below Lake Estes, are his favorites places to fish. Kirk also guides backpacking and llama pack trips. His favorite fishing buddies are his kids, Luke and Addy. But he and Laurie like to take off to find remote areas in RMNP to fish. Kirk also enjoys ice fishing in the winter and skiing.

Annual RMF Youth Day Camp

It's time for our annual Youth Day Camp!! Please encourage all your children, grandchildren and neighborhood kids to visit our website: http://nocotu.org/S/youthcamp

At this website, parents can download the Application Packet and schedule and read all about the camp which runs **July 27 through August 1**.

No previous fly fishing experience is required or expected. Applications are now being received, and earlier applications increase acceptance opportunity.

Cost for the camp is only \$30.00, and camper applicants also submit a (one-page maximum) self-description of their interest in the outdoors and why they want to attend the Day Camp. Fifteen campers ages 14 through 17 will be accepted, and will have a terrific time learning fly fishing skills fishing on the Poudre River and Rocky Mountain National Park, stillwater fishing at Swift Ponds, and the "why and how to" of conserving our cold water resources. We're also very excited this year to welcome **St. Peter's Fly Shop** as a partner. Guides from St. Pete's will be joining our instructional group for the Thursday Poudre River fishing day.

Other activities include:

- Fish Hatchery visitation
- Fish Electro-stunning & Identification
- Snorkeling to study underwater habitat
- Casting, riggings, knots & line management
- Trout Anatomy & behavior
- Aquatic Entomology & capturing live aquatic insects
- Fly Tying
- Water safety, netting & handling fish

April Conservation Notes

Although the calendar says it's early in April, the days are fast approaching when Rocky Mountain Flycasters needs volunteer commitments for two projects in early May. The first two Saturdays, May 2 and May 9 are the days when we need your help. But your action to sign up for either, or both, projects is what's needed right now. See below how easy it is to join in with other volunteers on these projects.

The Poudre watershed still suffers, in some places, from the effects of the High Park fire in 2012. And those effects were aggravated by the September 2013 flood. One of those places is Skin Gulch, a tributary that continues to carry massive amounts of silt into the Poudre River near the junction of Highway 14 and Stove Prairie Road. Our friends at the Coalition for the Poudre River Watershed (CPRW) are managing an ecological restoration project there on Forest Service land. The project

will stop the erosion by reconstructing the banks and riparian areas at the lower end of Skin Gulch.

Extensive earth-moving will be done by a contractor prior to May 2. Once that is completed, revegetation and some finishing touches on bank stabilization will be accomplished by volunteers using hand tools.

The primary source of volunteers will be Wildlands Restoration Volunteers (WRV), a group we have collaborated with in past years. For the Skin Gulch project, RMF has committed to provide 20 of the 70 volunteers needed on May 2. There will be a variety of tasks such as seed-bed preparation, seeding by hand techniques, mulching of seeded areas, and installation of anti-erosion mesh mats over some stream bank terrain.

On-line registration of volunteers from RMF is accomplished via the WRV web site www.wlrv.org. On the opening page, click on Projects and scroll down to the May 2 project at Skin Gulch. Follow the instructions for registering as a volunteer. As you go through that process, which begins with establishing your personal password for subsequent access to the website, you will see a box with an elective button alongside where you can identify your affiliation with our group. Click on that button and select "RMFlycasters". Following your registration, about a week prior to May2, you will receive an email from WRV informing you of project details, what to bring with you on May 2, and where to meet for car-pooling to the project site. Another opportunity to register as a volunteer will be paper forms at the April 15 general meeting of Rocky Mountain Flycasters.

Another Poudre River favorite project, entering its fifth consecutive year, is the Adopt-A-Trail program usually held at Gateway Natural Area. Dependent on needs, the location may be at another of the City of Fort Collins' Natural Areas along the Poudre. This program at Gateway involves trail rehabilitation near the confluence of the Poudre's North Fork with the Poudre's main stem. Work four hours in the morning, then enjoy a rewarding lunch, and fish in the afternoon. Two dates are scheduled; May 9 and July 18. The location will be selected a month prior to these dates.
