From the Editor: Donaldson Trout, 3 Fish in 1 at Red Feather Lakes

The Board of the Red Feather Lakes Storage and Irrigation System (RFSI, a group that monitors the 8 private lakes in Red Feather, rfsi.org) recently had an opportunity to make Donaldson Trout available to members and guests. With consultation from Aquatics Associates, a firm based in Fort Collins, they stocked 500 pounds of this hybrid trout in Shagwa Lake, a body of water that was given a total fresh start last year. The lake was completely drained and refilled. Six aerators were installed and minnows, crawfish and grass carp were stocked before putting the fish in the lake in April.

The Donaldson trout, also known as the Donaldson Steelhead or "Super Trout", is the result of the blending of Rainbows, Cutthroat and Steelhead trout. Dr. Lauren Donaldson produced this multi-species hybrid in 1944 after 14 years of research in the labs and the streams surrounding the University of Washington. Donaldsons are a fast growing, disease resistant and hard-fighting trout that act more like wild rather than a hatchery fish. Natural trout mature in 4 years and weigh in around 1.5 pounds, Donaldson Trout mature in two years and can weigh up to 10 pounds. Five hundred of these fish, ranging from 13 to 15 inches, were stocked in Shagwa in the spring. They are expected to range from 18 to 20 inches by October.

Most of us have caught Rainbow and Cutthroat Trout, frequently in local streams, lakes and ponds. Environmental and developmental conditions produce wide variation in coloration, but all rainbow trout have a pinkish band running the length of their body. Similarly Cutthroats have brilliant red marks on the underside of their jaws. Steelheads and Rainbows are actually of the same species and resemble one another physically. But their life cycles are vastly different. Rainbows are freshwater fish. Steelheads are anadromonous. They are born in freshwater, migrate to saltwater then back to freshwater to spawn. Consequently we must travel to see a Steelhead. They are known for the ferocity of their behavior on the hook. I once hooked one in the Deschutes River three

years ago. Although I didn't land this fish, they remain on my list.

So far I have had an opportunity to catch several of these hybrids in Shagwa and recently to host a Flycasters fishing trip to Red Feather. (The photos above are of Bob Magill and Mark Miller with their "wild prizes). I was totally taken by surprise with the first fish I caught, and continue to be in awe while catching these creatures. They take the fly and generally run deep and far, sometimes getting to my backing, much like a Bonefish. But, they don't stay deep. They jump (my first one five times) repeatedly. I was reminded of a miniaturized version of the 80 pound Tarpon I caught in Cuba last November!

Although these fish have been available nation-wide for a long time, I first heard about them this spring. I learned, for example, that they are used world-wide in commercial aquaculture operations. In a recent year 18,000 metric tons of Donaldsons were grown in sea cages in Finland. Norway produced the same quantity and Japan about 30,000 metric tons. The fish taste more like salmon than regular trout and ther flesh is salmon colored (or so I've read).

According to a representative of Acquatics Associates, Donaldsons are stocked in private lakes and streams throughout the front range. Colorado Fish and Wildlife does not stock them in public facilities. The closest private facility, about 5 miles north of Fort Collins, is the Rocky Ridge Outdoor Recreational Facility (https://coloradopros.com). Another venue, according to Grant Houx of St. Pete's is a ranch on the lower Blue River. Grant says the fish at this location are truly monsters.


