Hello readers. We recently had an "overhaul" from our newsletter vendor (Constant Contact). You may notice design changes in many areas. I am using this opportunity to describe some of the features of the new version of the newsletter, and to share some recently aggregated *Flypaper* statistics.

New Design

You probably have noticed a new masthead for The *Flypaper*. It's been at least 6 years since our masthead image has been changed and perhaps more than that. I know it's not been changed since I became editor. So, let's look at people, rather than fish, for a while when we first open *The Flypaper*.

We have also revised our "color" platform in this issue and have replaced the blue, red and white dominance with new colors. Nothing wrong with the old colors, just ready to try some new ones. We have also increased the ease with which you may link or toggle back and forth between *The Flypaper* and the website.

If you scroll down to the end of this issue you will find active links to each of the major sections of the Rocky Mountain Flycasters website. We hope these changes will be useful to you.

Statistics

Notice, also, the new award we received from Constant Contact. The All-Star award means that the open rate, the percentage of those who received the newsletter and opened *The Flypaper*, is among the top ten percent of all Constant Contact accounts! Thanks to all you "openers!".

In the past year the total number of *Flypaper* subscribers has grown from 1052 in January of 2019 to 1171 for the November issue, a growth of 119 subscribers, or about 10%. The open rate for the year was 38 per cent, although this rate varies from month to month. The open rate was 41 percent for the last edition (November) the highest of the year and 36 percent for the month of August, the lowest. More readers used a computer to open the newsletter (63 percent) than a mobile device (37 per cent) although the mobile device use is growing. Only 9 people ask to unsubscribe for the 12 month period.

This will be an exciting avenue for some member to help advance community awareness and appreciation of our Chapter.

Chair, Youth Outreach: This incredibly important position is one of our most personally rewarding experiences where you as can contribute your time and talent to the chapter. As part of the Volunteer Leadership Council, you will oversee the contributions of several highly committed volunteers who are directly responsible for operating the Youth Day Camp, Trout in the Classroom, Water Festivals, CSU Educational Learning Center, USFS Free Fishing Day, CSU Five Rivers Fly Fishing Club and potentially other new programs.

Coordinator, Trout In The Classroom: If you enjoy interacting with passionate instructors and students at the elementary, junior and high school, TIC Coordinator may be for you. Working with the schools, you will collaborate with teachers to establish tanks owned by RMF and assist them as they set up and manage the rearing of rainbow trout. What a great experience! The majority of this activity occurs during the October through May school academic year.

Thomas Wurster's Fishing Forecast from St. Peters Fly Shop



Happy Holidays! We sure do hope you enjoyed your Thanksgiving with family, food, and fish. December has arrived here on the Front Range and so has the snow, cold temperatures and that nasty wind we saw on Saturday.

As we arrive at the river we will notice some changes too such as crystal clear water, low water levels and colder temperatures both in the water and the air. We can refer to this time of the year as "midge season". Midges are going to be one of the biggest sources of food for trout during the winter when things cool down. Blue Wing Olive Mayflies also will be one of the more

important species of insect to imitate. Both nymphs and dries. Nymphing midges and BWO's will be a really productive way to start the day and given the right amount of sunlight and humidity you can catch some thick midge hatches and plenty of trout feeding off of the surface. Another thing to keep in mind is the fact that our freestone rivers will be freezing up very soon and tailwaters will be the places to find trout hanging out. Some fairly big ones too.

Aside from fishing small BWO Nymphs, this is another place where midges are going to be extremely effective. If we find ourselves stuck inside on cold days tying flies, reading and learning is one of the best ways to stay engaged and occupied with angling. Anytime you purchase a Renzetti Traveler Series vice, we will be giving out a free Intro to Tying Class which can be very useful for the new tier. If you are just getting started we are offering a free Intro to Fly Fishing class with a purchase of a Sage Foundation Combo equipped with the Sage Rod, Sage Spectrum Reel, Rio Gold Fly Line, Backing and Rio Leader. Christmas is right around the corner and if you are stumped for ideas check out the St.Peter's Holiday Gift Guide. Filled with items from socks and gloves all the way to premium rods and reels.

Talking to the staff can also influence some really good ideas so if you think your angler has it all, stop by and ask the folks at the shop. Don't miss some of the Simms apparel sales going on as well as some of the Free tying demos held most Saturdays at St.Pete's South throughout the winter. Watching some of the best tiers in the industry can be very beneficial for those looking for good tying techniques and coffee and doughnuts. Don't forget that sunny days make for very good fishing opportunities despite cool air temperatures. Fishing may seem scarce but there is absolutely some open water out there. We hope you stay warm and moving as this cold winter approaches. Stay updated with the latest river reports and enjoy the short holiday season.

Who Would Like to Backpack in RMNP?

As Thanksgiving and the Christmas season roll around, I know it is time for me to start planning our chapter fishing trips for next year. I enjoy this immensely. For the last several years, I have hoped to plan a backpacking trip in RMNP, for a small group of 4-6 crazy trout bums, for some high-country cutthroats. If we pull this trip together, it would likely be in mid to late August, and most likely a 4 day trip (one day hiking in, two days of fishing, and a fourth day to hike out for a cold beer and juicy burger. Then we can tend to those blisters and sore shoulders!
